#### Kokoda Expedition 2018

Walking Kokoda was probably one of the best things I have ever done in my life. It opened my eyes to so many things and it was truly an amazing experience. Even though I was disconnected from the world for nearly all of the trip, I didn't miss my phone or laptop at all. The group really bonded, with lots of fun and laughter as we walked the track. For me personally, the whole trip was made better by being able to walk it with my Dad.

The whole group was able to finish the track together, walking under the arches into Kokoda at the same time. Over the eight previous days of walking we had struggled together, triumphed together and finished together.

Altogether I am grateful for the opportunity to walk Kokoda with the school and I am truly grateful for being able to experience the history of the Kokoda Track and walk in the footsteps of the Australian soldiers who fought in the Kokoda campaign. The Kokoda trip was one of the best things I have ever done in my life. It wouldn't have been possible without Miss Kerr, Mr Caccamo and Mr Clements organising the trip, but also walking it with us and I really appreciate the work they did behind the scenes to get this trip to go to plan.

This speech was written to try and give you all a visual picture into your heads of a young male going to war in Kokoda. The speech is going to be told as if a young soldier was writing his experiences into a journal before Kokoda and at Kokoda. This is the speech I read at the dawn service.

"Two weeks ago today I turned sixteen, but the army doesn't know that. They think I turned eighteen, two months ago. Me being six foot two and a medium build I reckon I look older then I really am. Being accepted into the Australian Army wasn't hard at all. I just faked my parents' letter of consent and I was accepted that day into the 53<sup>rd</sup> Militia Battalion of NSW. I was told straight away I would be going to fight in the Kokoda Campaign in Papua New Guinea. Our enemy was the Japanese who had been making their way down Asia and were trying to eventually invade the homeland, Australia.

It has been four weeks since I last wrote into my journal. Since then we have left for Papua New Guinea and arrive in two days' time. Honestly I don't know what to expect. From what I have been told Papua New Guinea is a country full of rainforest and sun, but I am scared, I've never left Australia or my town. Hopefully though we can get rid of these Japs and be back home in a month or two and I can see me family again.

It has been a week since I last wrote and this may be my final writing. The track is miserable. It has been raining every day since we arrived and the ground has become mud everywhere. My pack is waterlogged and my clothes always drenched. It is almost unbearable the weight I have to carry up the massive mountains and ridges. I have yet to see battle, but have been told that will change in the next few days. I am scared, I am away from home and in a country foreign to me were the conditions are horrible. When I signed up I thought I was doing the honourable thing, but now I am reconsidering my choice.

Today I saw combat. Men around me died and Japanese in front of me as well. Men who I had started to gain a relationship with. Men who were just doing the honourable thing fighting for their country. I was scared the whole battle. Enemy we couldn't see because they blended in to the bushes. Bullets rained on us from everywhere. My second thoughts doubted me. I am scared of shooting my weapon and taking another man's life and I am scared for my own life. I am always scared for my life not knowing when the Japs will attack us. I am really reconsidering my choices, maybe this wasn't for me. Maybe I am not ready to take another man's life. My choices are limited. I either stay and fight for my country and probably die fighting or I can shoot myself in the foot and get an honourable discharge and go home to Sydney where it is safe and I can be with my family and I can forget this all happened. My choices will decide whether I live or not, I am scared for my own life."


















# SCHOOL CARPARKS





# Parking and traffic rules in school zones

You need to take extra care when driving and parking in school zones. Make sure that you and your child understand the road rules. If you break the traffic rules in a school zone you are putting not only your child but other children at risk. The parking and traffic rules around our schools are there to protect your children. If you break the rules you will be fined. Please choose safety over convenience.

QUICK REFERENCE GUIDE TO IMPORTANT SAFETY TRAFFIC RULES				
ZONE	WHAT DOES IT MEAN?	WHY IS IT THERE?	PENALTY	DEMERIT POINTS*
NO STOPPING	You cannot stop in a <b>NO STOPPING</b> zone for any reason (including queuing or waiting for a space).	Keeps clear sight lines between drivers and children / pedestrians.	\$330	(School Zone)
<b>₽</b>	You can stop in a <b>NO PARKING</b> zone for a max. of two minutes to drop off and pick up passengers. If no spaces are available you cannot queue on the road way or in any other zones while waiting for a space. You will need to drive away and park elsewhere, only returning when there is space to pull up.  You must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle at all times and cannot leave your vehicle unattended.	Provides a safe place for children / pedestrian set down and pick up.	\$183	(School Zone)
BUS	You must not stop or park in a <b>BUS ZONE</b> for any reason (including queuing or waiting for a space) unless you are driving a bus. If times are shown on the sign, you are not allowed to stop during those times.	Provides a safe place for large buses to set down and pick up school children.	\$330	(School Zone)
	You must not stop on or within 20 metres before a <b>PEDESTRIAN CROSSING</b> or 10 metres after a crossing unless there is a control sign permitting parking.	So drivers can clearly see pedestrians on the crossing.	\$439	(School Zone)
X	DOUBLE PARKING You must not stop on the road adjacent to another vehicle at any time even to drop off or pick up passengers.	Double parking blocks visibility and forces other cars to go around you.	\$330	(School Zone)
X 45	You must not stop on any FOOTPATH or NATURE STRIP, or even a DRIVEWAY crossing a footpath or nature strip for any reason.	You could easily run over a child or force pedestrians onto the road to get around you.	\$330	(School Zone)













# **Demerit Points:**

\* The **Demerit Points** Scheme is a national program that allocates penalty points (demerits) for a range of driving offences. A driver who has not committed any offences has 'zero' points. If you commit an offence that carries demerit points, the points are added to your driving record.

If you incur the threshold number of demerit points within a three-year period, a licence suspension or refusal is applied. The three-year period is calculated between the dates the offences were committed. It ends on the day your most recent offence was committed.


On Thursdays (sport days) all students in Years 9-11 must have their early leave notes signed by a member of the PE staff before presenting to the office.

# Correct Procedure When Approaching a Pedestrian Crossing

As you approach a pedestrian crossing or children's crossing where a School Crossing Supervisor is displaying a 'STOP Children Crossing' sign, you must slow down and stop. You may proceed when the School Crossing Supervisor no longer displays the sign in your direction or has indicated it is safe for you to proceed.



Stop signs may be placed at an intersection immediately after a pedestrian crossing. You must stop at the stop sign even if you have already stopped at the pedestrian crossing.

**Please Note:** If the road beyond a children's crossing or pedestrian crossing is blocked, you **MUST NOT** drive onto the crossing.
